Inclusive We create welcoming environments where students, volunteers, and supporters from diverse backgrounds gather.


Literacy

Letter from Our Chief Executive Officer

Tess, one of our High School Equivalency graduates, recently said, "Community means being connected with people. It's being aware of your surroundings and being a part of something bigger than yourself."

I am honored and proud to say that Indy Reads embodies this spirit in all it does to empower, uplift, and advance education equity in Indianapolis and beyond. Tess' words come to life as we reflect on the last year.

Community Means Being Connected to People

In December, I accepted the privilege of serving as Indy Reads' Chief Executive Officer. The first time I stepped into Indy Reads' as yet unopened space in Fountain Square, I knew I wanted to be a part of this mission. I envisioned our students from Afghanistan, Myanmar, Mexico, and down the street, reading their own stories or sharing family recipes on our community bookstore stage to an audience of peers and the wider Indianapolis community. When people from vastly different walks of life share space and story, stereotypes are broken down. Standing in that quiet room, I knew that, together, we could make this vision a reality.

Community Means Being Aware of Your Surroundings

Amid a pandemic, we realized that our students needed virtual options for programming and a way to improve their digital literacy skillsets to access those options. As we begin to offer in-person programming once more, digital literacy skills and virtual options remain a priority for Indy Reads.

One of the highlights of this past fiscal year was launching our Customer Service Skills Program, thanks—in large part—to the generosity of the Margot L. Eccles Arts & Culture Fund. This intensive program, which integrates our bookstore programming with our Community Classrooms programming, supports students in earning while they learn, preparing them to receive a Customer Service Credential while working in the bookstore at a living wage. This program is another step towards filling that once quiet room in the heart of Indy Reads with students from all walks of life, offering adults in this program the opportunity to succeed.

This year, Indy Reads also received recognition from a national foundation for the first time in its 38-year history. Support from the Welcome.US Fund allows us to forge even stronger connections with our neighbors, particularly immigrants and refugees, as we offer more language options, advance student recruitment, and engage more volunteers. This support is an important indicator that Indy Reads is increasingly recognized as an equitable and accessible community space for all.

Community Means Being a Part of Something Bigger Than Yourself

In my first year as Chief Executive Officer of Indy Reads, I have witnessed a fervent commitment to our vision of 100% literacy for all. For decades, we have been dedicated to empowering adults and their families to confidently attain economic prosperity, as well as personal fulfillment. From this crucial beginning, there is so far to go.

I am deeply grateful to work with our students, board of directors, volunteers, staff, and all of our supporters. This community has demonstrated a real passion and enthusiasm for the implications of our vision: the adults and families who make up our community have limitless potential for societal impact. Once we all have access to literacy, we all have access to civic engagement, to community development, and to use our skills, credentials, and talents to help our neighbors.

_____Our Programs and Impact ______

English Language Learning (ELL)	Offered both virtually and on-site around Indianapolis, ELL Community Classrooms help adults to master reading, writing, and comprehension of the English language. Our students work hard to unlock a future of greater potential through access to better job opportunities and increased confidence. In addition to Indy Reads' ELL Community Classrooms, we are an ELL adult education provider to the Immigrant Welcome Center's Pathway to Literacy Program, where adults with limited literacy in their native language can grow fundamental literacy skills before beginning their English studies in an ELL class.		
High School Equivalency Diploma (HSE)	More than 14% of Hoosiers in Indianapolis do not have their high school diploma and will earn an average of \$8,000 less per year than their peers with a diploma. Our virtual and on-site HSE Community Classrooms prepare adults to earn their HSE diploma by passing all five sections of the HiSET exam (reading; writing; math; social studies; and science).		
Certifications	We offer two industry-recognized online job certification courses: a Paraprofessional Training Certification and a Customer Service Certification. We also offer a unique Customer Service Skills Program where students gain real-world work experience in our community bookstore, at a living wage of \$15 per hour, while earning the Customer Service Certification.		
Literacy Foundations	Our Literacy Foundations program is designed for adults who would like to improve their English reading or language skills to achieve personal life goals, and are either not interested in or not quite ready to join our HSE or workforce certifications programs. This one-on-one or small group tutoring program provides flexible, personalized instruction to adults seeking to gain independence through literacy.

Student Success Stories



Kierra D., Paraprofessional Certification Graduate

Kierra is an Instructional Assistant at a childcare center who works with 3-5 year old children. She came to Indy Reads to earn her Paraprofessional Certification.

With two young daughters and more than 11 years of experience in the classroom, Kierra will use this certification to qualify for a pay increase in the shortterm. Kierra's long-term goal is to promote equity through early childhood education by opening her own childcare center.

"I think education is important," Kierra said. "I'm Black; I'm a woman; and I come from the inner city. I don't think you can do a lot of things in life if you don't have education behind you," she continued.

"In five years, I definitely want to have my own childcare center," she said. "Early childhood education is like the foremost important education, because it kind of sets the foundation of where you can go," Kierra finished.



Tess H., High School Equivalency (HSE) Graduate

Tess completed Indy Reads' Fast-Track HSE program in only a few months. An advocate for the power of community, her High School Equivalency diploma is the first step

in her journey to spreading positivity through missionary teaching.

"When I passed the HSE exam, I almost fell out of my chair," she said. "I've been accepted to Liberty University which is a Christian college. And I'm going for my Bachelor of Science in Biblical Education, so I'm one step closer to my dream of being that missionary teacher. This is blowing the roof off of my expectations for myself. There's so much more potential in me than I ever expected," Tess continued.

"I'm considered disabled according to the United States government," Tess said. "I was actually told by my therapist that at my age, I should be sitting in a mental facility, staring out the window, drooling. That was my future. So I said, 'I don't think so.' I've gotta be so much more than that," she finished.

"This is blowing the roof off of my expectations for myself. There's so much more potential in me than I ever expected."



Michelle S., Literacy Foundations and Pre-HSE Student

Michelle came to Indianapolis in 2017 with her husband after he was diagnosed with Stage 4 cancer. After he passed later that year, she joined Indy Reads' Literacy

Foundations program. Two years ago, she also joined our Pre-HSE program. A dedicated student and mother, Michelle is determined to move through the Indy Reads program to get her own house, find a fulfilling job, and attain her HSE diploma.

"My goals was to hopefully learn how to read completely and to move on from there," Michelle said. "Find me a job and a nice little place to live. I do want to get my high school diploma. You know, it's something I should have got that I missed out on getting and I would appreciate to have it," she continued.

"At Indy Reads, you get a chance to be around other people that's having the same issues that you got," Michelle said. "None of us are judgmental; we don't make fun of each other and stuff like that. When I came to this program, it was open arms for me," she finished.



Ngun Z., English Language Learning (ELL) Student

Ngun, originally from Myanmar, came to Indianapolis in 2020 with her husband and daughter. Ngun is determined to improve her English language skills, attain her High

School Equivalency diploma, and pay it forward.

"When I was a child, my parents couldn't communicate with my school teachers, because language and literacy difficulties," Ngun said. "Our language, Chin, is not the first language in Myanmar. So I have a lot of sad memories when I was a child. I decided to be a Mom who can support her children when they need my financials or giving advice," she continued.

"I want to be useful and valuable citizen for our community and for the country," Ngun said. "Right now, we get some help from other people. But I want to be the person who could help other people in five years. I have been helping my neighbors help their children doing homework. Or sometimes reading the important letters from the mail. I wish in five years, I could help in different ways or bigger ways. I'm really happy to help people," she finished.

Our Community Bookstore

Indy Reads offers community programs for adults and their families in our community bookstore in historic Fountain Square. The bookstore sells a wide selection of gently used books, as well as new inventory.



Financial Literacy Series

Financially literate individuals use financial knowledge to make better financial decisions. From everyday spending to long-term financial planning, effective money management means using money to further your personal goals—no matter what they are.

This series covered six workshops: Understanding Your Paycheck; Banking Services; Budgeting; Saving & Spending; Credit Basics; and Identity Theft. Workshops were led by Centier Bank: Indiana's Largest Private, Family-Owned Bank, in partnership with Indy Reads.

Poetry Open Mic & Slam with Booth

Indy Reads and Booth (students, faculty, and alumni from the Butler University MFA program) partner to host our community Poetry Open Mic & Slam each month. We welcome poets of all ages. The Open Mic & Slam is family-friendly—no curse words or explicit language are permitted.

The Poetry Slam is a competition where each contestant performs a poem and judges award points to select a winner. The Open Mic is a welcoming space for all poets to perform pieces without an element of competition. Prizes for the Poetry Slam include a subscription to Booth for one year and a free used book from Indy Reads.





Workshops, Author Events, and More!

Indy Reads partners with local artists, writers, and other facilitators to provide a rotating calendar of activities. From book launches to creative writing workshops to yoga between the shelves, we aim to offer programs for all members of our community.

Just a few of the highlights included a reading of *The Brightest Star* by James Morehead & Andrea Morehead Allen (pictured left); Writing for Mindfulness with Manon Voice; and Write Like a Writer with Julia A. Whitehead & Michael S. Maurer.

Indy Reads also hosts a weekly, all-ages Chess Club with Colin Hargreaves, regular bilingual storytimes, monthly Drag Story Hours, and local artists and vendors during the First Friday Book Donation Drive each month.


